

Since 1931, Rocky Mountain Conservancy has supported Rocky Mountain National Park and other public land partners through educational programs and philanthropic donations. Early on, the focus of the Conservancy was developing educational materials and publications for visitors to use while in Rocky Mountain National Park. Over the past eighty year, the Conservancy has grown to support its public land partners in a breadth of ways.

Currently, Rocky Mountain Conservancy contains five departments:

- Retail manages nature stores throughout Colorado and Wyoming to provide visitors with educational materials and interpretive products for visitors to learn more about public lands.
- **Publications** produces nature guides, children's literature, natural and cultural history books, and more to enrich people's experience in Rocky Mountain National Park and other public lands.
- **Philanthropy** connects people to Rocky Mountain National Park and the Conservancy through a membership program and donations supporting RMNP and Conservancy programs.
- **Education** provides field classes, internships, nature-based activities, and fellowships for people of all ages to further understand and connect with public lands.
- Conservation hosts the High School Leadership Corps, Conservation Corps, and Volunteer Stewardship
 programs to engage local high school youth, young adults (ages 18-25), and the public (all ages) in conservation
 work.

Conservation Corps Program Outline

The Rocky Mountain Conservancy created the Conservation Corps program in 2003. Initially, the program supported seven interns on one crew in Rocky Mountain National Park. In the years since, the program has grown to provide dozens of youth ages 18-25 with a summer-long internship opportunity on a variety of crews. In 2021, seven crews were based in four different locations, either within Rocky Mountain National Park or the surrounding Arapaho-Roosevelt National Forests.

Program Goals:

- 1. To empower youth with job skills, career development resources, a conservation ethic, and a connection to our nation's public lands to create the next generation of stewards.
- 2. To increase participant awareness of careers related to the environment, environmental stewardship, and public lands.
- 3. To link Conservation Corps projects to the missions and visions of the Rocky Mountain Conservancy, Rocky Mountain National Park/National Park Service, and Arapaho-Roosevelt National Forest/USDA Forest Service.
- 4. To increase participant awareness and use of effective leadership skills based on positive and constructive communication and to provide opportunity for practice of these skills.
- 5. To increase participant awareness of the cultural and natural history and environment of the Rocky Mountain region.
- 6. To inform crew members in the need for and use of various methods of construction for environmentally friendly trails, restoration, and reclamation projects.
- 7. To provide on-the-ground conservation work for Rocky Mountain National Park (RMNP) and the Arapaho-Roosevelt National Forest (ARNF).

The main 2021 season spanned eleven weeks between June 1 and mid-August. Two crews (Rocky Fire and extended season trails) completed a season from June 1 to mid-October. All crews work directly alongside the National Park Service (NPS) or USDA Forest Service (USFS) completing conservation projects summarized in the following pages. Intentional time throughout the summer was devoted to leadership training, educational programming, and career development opportunities from outdoor professionals such as the NPS and USFS.

The program provides work clothing, rented camping gear, housing for the duration of the term, and a biweekly living stipend to all members and leaders. The program is funded through generous donor support, in-kind gear donations, grant funding, and National Park Service and USDA Forest Service project funds.

The Rocky Mountain Conservancy's Conservation Corps is an AmeriCorps program through The Corps Network.

Rocky Mountain Conservancy's Conservation Corps launched its inaugural Fire Crew in the summer of 2021. This four-person crew served a longer season than most, with a season from June 1st to October 7th. The RMC Fire Crew has been working and training alongside Rocky Mountain National Park's fire team daily.





Primarily, the crew worked on fuels mitigation near Deer Mountain in Rocky Mountain National Park. There, they built over 150 slash piles- large bonfire-like piles of logs to be burned over the winter. They also gained dozens of hours of experience using chainsaws to fell and buck trees. As a result of their work, the landscape of the Deer Mountain area has drastically transformed from a dense, overgrown forest to a healthy (and safely distanced) stand of trees, one that is far less likely to exacerbate the effects of future wildfires and is a safer environment for firefighters to work.







Along with fuels mitigation, the Fire Crew worked on defensible spaces in the National Park, meaning they cleared a secure boundary around dozens of NPS buildings to protect and shield them from potential fires. Ultimately, all members of this crew exited their season with a nationally recognized Incident Qualification "Red Card" certification, enabling them to work as Type 2 Firefighter Crewmembers at the federal level in the future. Several members of 2021's Fire Crew plan to work as wildland firefighters for the National Park Service next season.

The 10-person Canyon Lakes super-crew lived in the US Forest Service's Stub Creek cabin, deep in the Rawah Wilderness. The Canyon Lakes crew served many parts of the Canyon Lakes Ranger District, from the Rawah and Comanche Peak Wilderness areas to numerous trails along the Poudre Canyon. Over the course of the summer, the crew successfully cleared or dug nearly 200 drains to aid in trail longevity and durability. Similarly, they completed numerous trail reroute projects, in which they constructed over 300 feet of new and durable rock wall and tread that will last for decades to come.



After the devastating Cameron Peak fire of 2020, the Canyon crew worked tirelessly to rehabilitate and reopen decimated trails such as the Rawah's Blue Lake Trail and the Poudre Canyon's Roaring Creek. Thanks to their efforts on a week-long backcountry hitch, the Blue Lake trail was reopened for the public to explore and enjoy.







Over the summer, the Canyon Crew went on plenty of weekend adventures in their backyard, the Rawah Wilderness.

Renting outdoor gear from RMC (free of charge) allows all corps members the opportunity to be prepared for, and safely experience, the wonderful natural areas that northern Colorado has to offer.



The only RMC Conservation Corps crew stationed on the West side of the Continental Divide, the Sulphur crew was a conglomeration of two separate crews. One crew worked with the Arapaho National Recreation Area (ANRA), while the other partnered with the trails department of the Sulphur Ranger District of the Arapaho-Roosevelt National Forests. The ANRA crew focused on rehabilitation and maintenance of front-country campsites in and around Grand Lake, Colorado. Projects for this crew included the fixing, building, and painting over 40 picnic tables used in campgrounds and other public areas, as well as general upkeep of the Shadow Mountain Work Center. Valuable skills like roofing, use of power tools, and herbicide application on invasive species were learned and practiced through their summer season.





The crew partnering with the Forest Service trails team spent several weeks "on hitch," where they camped in the backcountry of the National Forest and spent many longs days using a decades old, 6-foot-long crosscut saw to eradicate over 460 fallen trees that were blocking numerous trails. Throughout the 11-week season, both Sulphur crews (along with a few llamas to pack in tools and equipment) were often enlisted to camp out in the backcountry and help dismantle these ecological impediments. Everyone on the Sulphur crews left this season with a nationally recognized Crosscut Bucking certification, which they earned through educational classes and experiences with the Forest Service.







The 2021 Sulphur crews wrapped up their summer with a nationally recognized Crosscut Bucking "B" certification, which they earned through a multi-day educational session through the US Forest Service. The Crosscut certification allows crew members to clear downed trees in true Wilderness areas, where machines such as chainsaws cannot be used.

The Boulder Crew began their season at lower elevations with work on more "front-country" trails due to the significant snowpack on higher elevation trails. Along the Bright Trail, the Boulder Crew helped to improve trail conditions and construct various rock structures, such as retaining walls, check steps, and water bars. This work helps clarify the trail corridor and fortifies the trail surface to prevent erosional impacts from high use and weather. On the Rainbow Lakes trail, the crew dismantled illegal fire rings and rehabilitated 47 dispersed campsites.





The Boulder Crew spent the final weeks of their season on three backcountry hitches at the Isabelle Glacier Trail in the Brainard Lake Recreation Area. This project focused on construction of a large rock staircase in a vast talus field of boulders, far above tree line. The crew teamed up with the Boulder Climbing Community's Front Range Climbing Stewards (FRCS), a professional trail crew with admirable technical prowess to complete this project. The work was hard, and the conditions exhausting, but the views and memories (and the trail!) will last a lifetime.

The Moraine crew lived in their namesake geological formation, Rocky Mountain National Park's Moraine Park – a massive glacially sculpted valley remaining from the last glacial maximum approximately 25,000 years ago. Their home was Rocky's Moraine Park Campground, overlooking a beautiful riverine meadow.





Comprised of seven members hailing from across the country, the crew worked alongside Rocky Mountain National Park's trail crew. The group spent the first half of their season doing maintenance runs throughout Rocky National Park – hiking several miles daily while clearing drains to ensure minimal soil erosion and witnessing the Park's natural beauty. The second half of Moraine Crew's summer was spent working right in their backyard, on the Fern Lake trail, in order to combat the effects of the East Troublesome Fire. There, they installed nearly 40 log check steps and multiple rock walls to improve trail stability and accessibility.

While most of the RMC Conservation Corps returns to home or school in mid-August, those who are willing and able to continue their season of environmental stewardship may join the Extended Season Trail Crew from mid-August to mid-October. While this opportunity is open and available to any RMC Corps member from any crew, the 2021 Extended Crew was (coincidentally) made up of entirely Canyon Lakes crew members.



This season's project was located right in the heart of Estes Park. On the south side of Prospect Mountain lies two notable rock formations, known as the Needle and the Thumb. On these towering granite pillars lie dozens of bolted rock-climbing routes, ranging from beginner to expert difficulties. Professional rock climbers and mountaineers like Tommy Caldwell and Tom Hornbein have cited this crag as a crucial training ground that helped launch their careers.



Historically located on privately owned property, the town of Estes Park (with substantial assistance from the Rocky Mountain Conservancy and several other nonprofit organizations) purchased 65 acres of land to preserve and maintain access to these climbing areas. Now known as the "Thumb Open Space," the extended crew's project was to rebuild the existing trail, but not in the same way as may other hiking trails are built.

The Thumb trail will be one of the first of its kind- a hiking trail that is accessible and usable for travel by handcycle and other mobility devices used by adaptive athletes. The multi-use trail will allow users of all abilities to access and utilize a climbing area with plentiful views and a fascinating history of interagency partnerships and collaboration.
