

Volunteer Stewardship Program
2019 Season





Since 1931, Rocky Mountain Conservancy has supported Rocky Mountain National Park and other public land partners through educational programs and philanthropic donations. Early on, the focus of the Conservancy was developing educational materials and publications for visitors to use while in Rocky Mountain National Park. Over the past eighty years, the Conservancy has grown to support its public land partners in a breadth of ways.

Currently, Rocky Mountain Conservancy contains five departments:

- **Retail** manages 42 nature stores throughout Colorado and Wyoming to provide visitors with educational materials to enhance their experience.
- **Publications** produces nature guides, children's literature, natural and cultural history books, and more.
- **Philanthropy** connects people to Rocky Mountain National Park through newsletters updating constituents on upcoming project and raises funds for RMNP and Conservancy programs through donor outreach, grant proposals, and community engagement. Funds are used for specific projects including land acquisition, historical preservation, trail maintenance, building construction, and education.
- **Education** provides field classes, internships, nature-based activities, and fellowships for people of all ages to further understand and connect with public lands.
- **Conservation** offers opportunities for youth, young adults, and local populations to learn about conservation through service opportunities including the High School Leadership Corps, Conservation Corps, and Volunteer Stewardship Days (see below).

Volunteer Stewardship Program Outline

The Rocky Mountain Conservancy has hosted volunteer events for Conservancy Members since 2014. These were focused on getting Members out with the Conservation Corps on National Trails Day to kick off the Corps season. Based on increasing interest in single-day volunteer projects, the Conservancy began hosting a full schedule of volunteer events in 2018. Since, the schedule has included public volunteer days and private volunteer days for community organizations, youth groups, and corporations. Projects occur within Rocky Mountain National Park and in the surrounding Arapaho-Roosevelt National Forests.

Program Goals:

- 1. To increase participant understanding and appreciation of public lands.
- 2. To foster participant awareness of conservation issues and public land management.
- 3. To develop stewardship skills and ethics in participants.
- 4. To inform participants on the role and value of public land partnerships in pursuing conservation outcomes.
- 5. To connect participants with the Rocky Mountain Conservancy through hands-on service.
- 6. To provide on-the-ground support for priority conservation needs of the Conservancy's public land partners.
- 7. To support other local conservation-based non-profits in collaborative efforts to engage communities in stewardship work.

Project Descriptions

Litter Clean-Up

• The Conservancy celebrated Colorado Public Lands Day and National Public Lands Day with projects near the Beaver Meadows Entrance to Rocky Mountain National Park removing a cumulative of more than 200 lbs. of trash from Rocky (5/18 and 9/28).

Trails – The Conservancy's Volunteer Stewardship Days supported several trail projects in 2019. These included:

- Restoring trail corridor on the Cub Lake Trail through the construction of structures (check steps and water bars) to fortify the trail and obliteration of braided trail sections (6/1);
- Building turnpike over a wetland area of the South Boulder Creek Trail in the James Peak Wilderness to mitigate trail erosion and watershed pollution in partnership with the Indian Peaks Wilderness Alliance (6/22);
- Rerouting the Mitchell/Blue Lake Trail in the Brainard Lake Area of the Indian Peaks Wilderness to make a more sustainable surface and mitigate erosion in partnership with the Indian Peaks Wilderness Alliance (7/20);
- Installing check-dams near the North Fork Trail in the Comanche Peaks Wilderness to reestablish soil along heavily eroded sections of the former trail after it was rerouted due to the 2013 Colorado floods with the Poudre Wilderness Volunteers (8/3);
- Fortifying the Book Access Trail in Lumpy Ridge by installing steps to mitigate erosion (8/24); and,
- Constructing a trail bridge on Buffalo Creek Trail in Arapaho National Forest near Hot Sulphur Springs, CO with the Headwaters Trail Alliance (9/28).

Resources – The 2019 Resource Stewardship projects helped to restore habitat and foster native plant growth by:

- Transporting and repurposing unused mulch from past project site to finalize restoration efforts in Moraine Park after infrastructure updates disturbed the meadow (6/12, 6/20, and 9/26);
- Eradicating Musk Thistle, Common Mullein, and Houndstongue in Moraine Park, Beaver Meadows, and Horseshoe Park areas of Rocky Mountain National Park (6/21, 6/24, 8/2, 8/21, 8/22, 8/23, 9/4, and 9/25)
- Mechanically removing Houndstongue and Scentless Chamomile from the area surrounding the Kawuneeche Visitor (7/31); and,
- Collecting native plant seeds from future restoration areas to establish greenhouse seed bank (9/25 and 9/26).
